

Bear Hunting in Michigan's Western U.P.

The Western Upper Peninsula is one of Michigan's best places to hunt bears. With almost one million acres of Ottawa National Forest plus state forests with terrain from swampy areas to hills, the region offers hunters an unforgettable wilderness experience. But with that opportunity comes responsibility — respecting the land, other hunters, and the wildlife is essential to keeping this tradition strong for future generations.

A Century of Bear Hunting Tradition

Bear hunting has deep roots in the Western U.P. In fact, hunters have been legally hunting black bears in the Ottawa National Forest for 100 years when the State of Michigan first declared black bears a game animal in 1925. The long tradition continues today, built on respect for the land, fair chase, and responsible wildlife management.

Respect the Area and Other Hunters

When hunting in the Western U.P., always treat the land and fellow hunters with respect. Don't leave garbage behind, and never hunt in areas where other hunters are already baiting. Many hunters arrive a week or more before their hunt to start baiting, so be mindful of established sites. Local bait shops are a great place to learn where others are baiting and to get advice on baiting techniques and hunting conditions. A little courtesy goes a long way in maintaining good relationships among the hunting community.

Get Local Knowledge — and Your License

Stop by your local bait shop before heading out. The folks there not only sell bait but also often know the local rules, what baiting methods are common in the area, current road conditions and which forest roads or trails are accessible, and the current bear activity. They can also make sure you have the proper bear hunting license. You may be able to purchase one while you are at the shop or online through the Michigan DNR website. While at the shop, they can also direct you to the nearest DNR registration station (which may be right there at the shop!) — because if you're successful and harvest a bear, you must register it. Registration is a required step and helps the Michigan DNR track the bear population and manage the hunt responsibly.

Safety in the Woods

Bear hunting in the U.P. means heading deep into the forest, so safety should always come first. Bring proper survival gear, extra food and water, and dress for changing weather. A GPS unit is highly recommended, since compasses are often unreliable around the old copper country. Be cautious around swamps and low areas where it's easy to lose your bearings.

The Michigan DNR requires hunters with firearms to wear hunter orange during bear season. Failing to do so can lead to fines, and more importantly, puts your safety at risk. Always make sure you're visible to other hunters.

Know the Rules

Before your hunt, review the current regulations on the Michigan DNR website at www.michigan.gov/dnr. One of the most important rules is that you cannot shoot a sow with cubs. Cubs stay with their mother for about two years while learning how to find food and den safely for the long U.P. winters. Respecting this rule helps protect the future of the bear population for the next 100 years.



Lake Gogebic Ice Fishing: Seasonal Guide & Jumbo Perch Tips

Bergland, MI – Lake Gogebic, the Upper Peninsula's largest inland lake, transforms into a winter angler's paradise when ice forms, typically from late December through early March. Known for walleye, northern pike, and especially jumbo perch, the lake draws fishing enthusiasts from near and far.

Seasonal Timeline

Early Winter (Late December – Mid January): Ice is forming; anglers should check ice thickness carefully. Tip-ups and jigging near shallow bays can yield early catches of perch and panfish.

Mid-Winter (Late January – February): Peak ice thickness allows access to all parts of the lake. This is prime time for jumbo perch, which tend to school in deeper bays and near weed edges.

Late Winter (March – Early April): Ice starts thinning; focus shifts to safety and targeting larger, deeper-water fish before ice-out.

Jumbo Perch Fishing Tips

Location: Jumbo perch often congregate near submerged structures, drop-offs, and points in 10–25 feet of water. Popular areas include near islands and deeper bays.

Bait & Tackle: Use small minnows, waxworms, or spikes on light jigging rods or tip-ups. Bright-colored jigs (pink, chartreuse, or glow) attract perch in low-light conditions.

Technique: Jigging: A slow, subtle lift and drop keeps perch interested.

Tip-ups: Set multiple tip-ups with live bait in schools; check frequently to avoid losing fish.

Timing: Early morning and late afternoon often produce the largest perch, especially when snow cover is minimal.

Safety Tips

Check ice thickness: Minimum 4 inches for walking, 5–7 inches for snowmobiles, 8–12 inches for vehicles.

Bring safety gear: Ice picks, life vests, and a rope are essential.

Buddy system: Fish with a partner or let someone know your location.

Local Resources

Guides & Rentals: Several local guides offer ice fishing tours, gear, and shanty rentals.

Bait Shops: Bergland and surrounding communities have shops stocked with minnows, waxworms, and tackle.

Lake Gogebic and fishing

Lake Gogebic is the largest inland lake in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, nestled in Michigan's Western Upper Peninsula. Covering more than 13,000 acres, Lake Gogebic is approximately 18 miles long north to south, and 2½ miles wide. The lake spans two time zones and covers parts of Gogebic and Ontonagon counties and lies entirely within the 1-million-acre Ottawa National Forest.

Uniquely shaped like an inverted boot, Lake Gogebic features rock/cobble/gravel shorelines with depths reaching up to 35 feet which is perfect for various fish species to thrive. While Lake Gogebic holds a reputation as a top walleye and jumbo perch fishing destination, anglers can also target smallmouth bass, northern pike, jumbo perch, black crappie, bluegill, pumpkinseed sunfish, rock bass, and yellow perch.

This means that no matter what your preferred fishing style or target species may be, Lake Gogebic has something to offer you. Whether you're looking for the thrill of reeling in a trophy-sized smallmouth bass or hoping to catch some delicious perch for a fish fry, this picturesque lake is sure to provide you with plenty of exciting fishing adventures.

Like the fish in many lakes in the northern U.S. and Canada, Gogebic's fish populations rely heavily on insects and insect larvae as a food source. The great thing about Lake Gogebic is that there are few places on the lake an angler can't catch fish. That includes the seemingly featureless mid-lake abyss. Gamefish like walleyes and yellow perch are so insect-oriented in their feeding behavior that mid-lake mud flats tend to hold fish nearly year around.

During the early open-water season the action moves to the shorelines and walleyes, perch, smallmouth bass, northern pike, all species—concentrate on shoreline structure just about everywhere on the lake which offers many opportunities to catch a lot of fish from the bank, and from docks. Rock dominates Gogebic's shoreline, so to locate the most active fish focus on wind-blown sections and start your search in 8 to 10 feet of water.

A good time to fish the north (boot) end of the lake is when warmer weather and higher water temperatures take over and weeds begin to emerge. In the late-summer/early-fall period weedbeds once again become a focal point for all gamefish species. While good beds can be found along various shorelines the south end is full of weeds.

Fishing Tips and Techniques for Walleye on

Lake Gogebic

Fishing for walleye in Lake Gogebic requires choosing the right bait and lures. Here's a roundup of the best options:

Opt for hard – baits or crankbaits as they are among the most effective for catching walleyes.

Spinners and spoons also find favor with anglers due to their versatility and wide appeal to walleyes.

Among jerkbaits, blade baits hold a special place since they have consistently delivered positive results in hooking walleyes.

Try diversifying your lure collection with a variety of colors, sizes, and actions as walleye can be selective eaters depending upon the water conditions.





My First Walleye Tournament Experience

The 47th Annual Lake Gogebic Fall Walleye Tournament was the first fishing event I’ve ever been part of—and considering fishing has never exactly been my thing, that’s saying something. My husband, Steve, on the other hand, is an avid fisherman through and through.

I’ll admit it: I don’t have the patience to sit and wait for a fish to bite. When Steve and I go “fishing” together, I’m in the front of the canoe paddling while he directs where I should go, and he’s in the back with all the poles in the water. He likes to tell people I make a pretty good trolling motor. I like to tell people I have the best deal of all—he catches, cleans, and cooks the fish, and I simply enjoy the meal!

If Steve had told me a few years ago—back when we bought the resort—that I’d someday help run a fishing tournament, measuring fish and doing registrations, I would’ve laughed. And yet, here I was, volunteering myself for exactly that.

Before the tournament, I did my homework. Steve offered plenty of tips. But as the date got closer and I still couldn’t find anyone to run the measuring station, the nerves kicked in. I didn’t know the first thing about fish. What does a walleye even look like? Or a bass, a perch, or a northern?

I knew I’d be measuring the fish as anglers brought them in, and my first thought was, How am I supposed to hold the fish and take a picture at the same time? Thankfully, the answer was simple: the fishermen knew exactly what they had caught. They told me the species, I marked it in the right category, they placed it on the bump bar, and I snapped the photo. Easy.

Huge thanks to Mary Beth DeFazio from AJ’s Lodge and Oven and Shawn Montie from Gogebic Grocery for organizing the event and making sure everything ran smoothly. And honestly, thank goodness the fishermen knew the process—they led, and I learned.

At check-in, I was ready bright and early with my stamp pad and pen to mark registration times. Someone had mentioned I’d need a bullhorn to start the tournament—except we didn’t have one. So in true Northwoods fashion, Steve and I improvised and used the lake lights as the official start signal.





Welcome Snowmobilers

Michigan's Western Upper Peninsula offers a variety of snowmobiling opportunities. In order to protect resources, the rights of others and to provide for your pleasure and safety, a variety of Local, State and Federal laws and regulations have been adopted. Some of the subject they address include:

Travel on Roads

In general snowmobiles may not be operated on a public highway or street. You may however, operate your snowmobile:

- On the unplowed right-of-way of a public highway except a limited access highway. The snowmobile must be operated with the flow of traffic.
- On the roadway or shoulder when necessary to cross a bridge or culvert.
- Across a public highway, other than a limited access highway, at right angles for the purpose of getting from one area to another.
- On the shoulder of a county road only when no right-of-way exists on all snowplowed roads in the Gogebic County Road system which are outside of the incorporated city or village, which is designated and marked for snowmobile use by the county road-system having jurisdiction. EXCEPTIONS WILL BE POSTED.
- On unplowed Forest Service roads within the Ottawa National Forest. Exceptions to this rule will be posted.

Trespass

About forty percent of the land within the Ottawa National Forest is privately owned. The following rules apply to these and all other private land in Michigan:

- A person shall not operate a snowmobile in or upon a private property without consent of the landowners.
- The Recreational Trespass Act requires written consent from the owner, his agent, or lessee before operating a snowmobile on lands which are:
- Fenced or enclosed and maintained in a manner to exclude entry.
- Posted in a conspicuous manner against intruders.
- Farmlands or connected wood lots.

Maps of the Ottawa national Forest that show the location of National Forest Land and on Off-Road Vehicle Users' Guide to the Forest area available from the Supervisor's Office in Ironwood and from District Ranger Offices in Bergland, Bessemer, Iron River, Kenton, Ontonagon, and Watersmeet.

Other Areas of Operation

A person may not operate a snowmobile:

- On a railroad right-of-way
- In or across a cemetery or burial ground
- On land used as a public highway or street
- On National Forest lands, roads, or trails when there is less than 4 inches of snow on the ground
- On National Forest trails that have been designated for non-motorized uses such as skiing and hiking.

Complete copies of the State of Michigan Snowmobile Rules and Regulations may be obtained from any Michigan Department of Natural Resources office. The grooming and maintenance of the trails shown on this map and the acquisition of the easements and right-of-way needed for them are the result of cooperative efforts of:

- Local units of governments
- Michigan Department of Natural Resources
- U.S. Department of Agriculture, Forest Service
- Snowmobile clubs and local business
- Western Upper Peninsula Snowmobile Council

Chasing Waterfalls in Michigan's Western Upper Peninsula

The western Upper Peninsula of Michigan is famous for its wild forests, rocky shorelines, and endless natural beauty — but what draws many visitors are the waterfalls. Fed by Lake Superior's rainfall and snowmelt, the rivers and streams tumble through the rugged terrain, offering dozens of waterfalls to explore. A tour centered around the Porcupine Mountains, Bond Falls, the Black River Harbor Scenic Byway, and even the uniquely named Alligator Eye provides a perfect road trip loop for adventurers.

Porcupine Mountains Waterfalls

The Porcupine Mountains Wilderness State Park — “the Porkies” — holds some of the U.P.'s most striking cascades.

Presque Isle River Falls: A short drive to the north end of the park leads you to three iconic falls in quick succession — Manabesho, Manido, and Nawadaha. These are dramatic, powerful drops framed by old-growth forest and accessible by well-marked trails.

Union Bay Trails & Smaller Falls: Inside the park you'll also find smaller cascades tucked along hiking routes,

adding surprise beauty to a day on the trail.

Bond Falls

About 30 minutes southeast of Lake Gogebic, Bond Falls is one of the U.P.'s most photographed waterfalls. The Ontonagon River spreads wide across fractured rock ledges, creating a 50-foot curtain of water that feels both massive and approachable.


Accessibility: Boardwalks and multiple viewing platforms make this an easy stop for all ages.

Photography: Wide-angle shots capture the entire sheet of water, while side trails offer more secluded perspectives.

Nearby stop: The tiny community of Paulding is just down the road, and the area is also home to the mysterious “Paulding Light.”

Black River Harbor & Scenic Byway

North of Bessemer, the Black River tumbles toward Lake Superior, carving a deep gorge with a string of waterfalls — nearly one per mile. The Black River National Scenic Byway guides visitors along this route to the harbor.



Highlights include:

Great Conglomerate Falls – Two powerful channels divided by a massive rock outcrop.

Potawatomi & Gorge Falls – Side-by-side cascades, both accessible from the same parking area and connected by a boardwalk.

Sandstone Falls – A stair-step drop perfect for photos.

Rainbow Falls – Just upstream from Lake Superior, where mist often creates rainbows.

At the end of the road, Black River Harbor offers a suspension bridge to Lake Superior's shoreline, making it a full day's adventure.

Alligator Eye

Though not technically a waterfall, **Alligator Eye** near Lake Gogebic is a must-see natural landmark that pairs perfectly with a waterfall tour. It's a rocky outcrop at the end of a peninsula in Lake Gogebic that resembles the eye of an alligator peeking from the

water.

Hike: The trail is short but offers sweeping lake views.

Best time: Fall color season, when the forests blaze red, orange, and gold around the lake.

Tip: Pair this with a visit to Bond Falls for a day loop south of the lake.

Planning Your Loop

Start at Lake Gogebic or Watersmeet.

Bond Falls → drive east to Paulding. **Porcupine Mountains** → loop north into the state park and explore Presque Isle.

Black River Harbor Scenic Byway → drive west toward Bessemer for the series of five major waterfalls.

Finish with a relaxing hike to **Alligator Eye** back near Lake Gogebic.

This loop delivers the best of the western U.P. — waterfalls, Lake Superior views, wilderness trails, and the chance to slow down in small towns along the way.

Campgrounds on Lake Gogebic

1. Ontonagon County Park

(also called Ontonagon County Park on Lake Gogebic)

Location & Setting:

Located on the west shore of Lake Gogebic, south of Merriweather on M-64 (in Ontonagon County). Ontonagon Chamber of Commerce+2Outdoorsy+2

What to expect:

- Access to the lake via boat launch and swim area. theporcupinemountains.com+2Outdoorsy+2
- 53 electric (30–50 amp) campsites and water access to all sites. Snowriver Mountain Resort

- Large sites, good for RVs, and a dump/fill station is available. The Dyrt review noted the staff was friendly and the location quiet with lake views. Outdoorsy+1

Best for:

Families or RVers who want full-lake access (fishing/boating) and moderately good camping amenities without being in a highly-developed resort area.

Tips & caveats:

- Since it's on the lake, some sites may be less private (depending on layout).
- If you're after premium "lakeside" branding, ask for lake-view or near-shore sites in advance.
- Check for any seasonal dates: the swimming area may have restrictions (e.g., swimmers' itch warnings) per reviews. The Dyrt

2. Lake Gogebic State Park

Location & Setting:

On the western shore of Lake Gogebic, in the heart of the Ottawa National Forest region. Lake Gogebic Area

Chamber of Commerce+1

Highlights:

- Founded 1930; sits on Michigan's largest inland lake in the UP. Lake Superior Circle Tour
- About ¼ of its ~127 campsites are directly lake-front; the remaining are nestled among trees, no more than ~100 feet from the lake. uptravel.com+1
- Amenities include beach, boat launch, modern restrooms/showers in some loops. Tripadvisor+1

Important Note:

The modern campground and cabins are temporarily closed for a major enhancement project (water, sewer, electrical) — closure began August 18 2025 and is expected to reopen July 20 2026. Michigan+1

Best for:

When open, this is ideal for campers wanting "state-park" infrastructure (beach, lakefront, trails) in a major recreation setting.

Tips & caveats:

- Do not plan this year if you want the full campground experience — check status/reservations before booking.
- For tent campers rather than RVs, some of the more wooded sites may offer more privacy but fewer full hookups.
- Because it's popular, lakeside sites may book early — plan ahead and look for early-reservation windows.

3. Bergland Township Park & Campground

Location & Setting:

Located on Bergland Bay on Lake Gogebic, in Bergland Township. Bergland Township+2Bergland Township+2

Campground Details:

- Lower campground: 13 campsites with 30-amp hookups. Upper camp-

ground: 7 more scattered sites with 20-amp. Bergland Township+1

- Features: beach, playground, boat ramp, dump station. Wanderlog

Best for:

Budget-friendly, more "local" campground feel, especially for folks who might also want ATV/ORV/snowmobile access (since Bergland is near many trails) and access to lake.

Tips & caveats:

- Some sites have only 20-amp service — RVers with heavy demands should confirm. Campendium
- The campground is fairly small — booking early or arriving early is a good plan in peak season.
- Because of its simpler infrastructure, expect fewer "luxury" amenities and maybe less site separation/privacy.

4. Hamilton's North Coast Adventures

(Base & Adventure Hub)

Overview:

Located just north of Lake Gogebic and near the Porcupine Mountains Wilderness State Park, this business is not a traditional campground (though lodging is available) but a one-stop adventure operator and lodging base for exploring trails, UTV/ATV or snowmobile, and access to the lake area. Hamilton's North Coa+2Lake Gogebic Area Chamber of Commerce+2

What they offer:

- Guide-led tours, equipment rentals (EV-off-road, snowmobiles) and lodging options (cabins, RV sites) so you can "stay and play". Hamilton's North Coa+1
- They highlight location "directly on the trails" and service personnel who know the area well. Pioneer Lodging+1

Best for:

Adventure-seekers who want more than just lakeside camping — if you plan to explore ORV/ATV trails, snowmobile terrain in winter, or use a base to access both water and trail systems, this is a strong choice.

Tips & caveats:

- Because this is less a "traditional campground" and more a hybrid of lodging + adventure rentals, check what kind of RV/tent sites are offered and what the rates are.
- If you want a quiet tent-camp experience without heavy off-road traffic, this might be more "activity hub" than "remote quiet camping".
- Book early in peak seasons, especially for lodging options.

5. The Timbers Resort.

On north shore in Bergland has 4 camp sites with electric hookup. Call 906-575-3542. www.thetimbersresort.com.

6. Thousand Island Resort on the Cisco Lakes Chain:

Michigan Trails and Recreation Alliance of Land and the Environment

You might have heard of MI-TRALE, but do you know what all those letters truly stand for? The “MI” is for Michigan. The “T” is for Trails. The “R” is for Recreation. The “A” is for Alliance. The “L” is for Land. The “E” is for Environment. Put them all together and they stand for Michigan Trails and Recreation Alliance of Land and the Environment. MI-TRALE.

We are a group of concerned volunteer citizens that manage to care for 300+ miles of DNR designated ORV multi-use trails and 200+ miles of Club ORV multi-use trails. The funds to do all of this trail work come from the DNR allocating ORV License and Sticker fee dollars to us through the DNR Off-Road Vehicle Trail Improvement Grant Fund Program. This has amounted to over \$2.0 Million dollars over the last nine years. This means that MI-TRALE is the Alliance that cares for the Land and the Environment upon which you have a number of Trails to travel in a variety of Recreational ways in the Western Upper Peninsula of Michigan.

MI-TRALE represents our population on all governmental levels from Local, through to State and upwards to Federal. We have developed and support a FREE Map App (Michigan UP Trails) as well as paper maps. These both show the over 500+ miles of our ORV multi-use maintained trails and 2,200 miles of Ottawa National Forest (ONF) Roads for ORV use.

MI-TRALE has also worked in conjunction with the ONF to develop approximately 18 miles of Equestrian Trails and Equestrian Campsites at the Courtney Lake Recreation Area. For more information on all of these trails along with 19 marked Water Trails for non-motorized craft, go to our website: www.mi-trale.org and you will find all the information you need on all of our ORV, Horse and Water trails along with our Map App and how to acquire a paper map. You can also find us on FACEBOOK. Visitors are always welcome to our monthly club meetings. They are generally held the first Monday of every month at 7:00pm Eastern in Bruce Crossing, MI.

As part of MI-TRALEs caring for the environment, we have Adopted-A-Highway for three Clean-Ups during the year. It is the 2-mile stretch of M-28 East starting just past the Bruce Crossing Fire Station moving eastward. We are

always happy to have extra volunteers to lend a hand with this community service! If interested, you can contact us through our website.



Some Reasons for considering the Western U.P.

Grouse hunting in the western Upper Peninsula is a wild, rewarding challenge. The combination of rugged terrain, variable cover, and lower hunting pressure offers a unique experience to those willing to walk the miles and read the woods carefully. As one seasoned U.P. hunter put it, the western end “is prime grouse country” when conditions and timing align.

- Prime habitat: The western U.P. includes large blocks of public lands, state and national forests, and historically active logging regions with regenerating aspen, birch, and mixed hardwoods. These “young cut” areas are classic grouse cover.
- Less pressure: Hunters report the western end often has lighter pressure, especially early in the season, which gives a better chance to hunt more intimately with the habitat.
- Guided options: Businesses and outfitters around Lake Gogebic and elsewhere in the western U.P. promote “world-class grouse hunting,” often

with walking trails and dog support.

- Accommodations: There are many options for lodging, including many “dog-friendly” options. Dining throughout the western U.P. offers everything from the local pub-n-grub, to wood-fired pizza’s, to casual upscale. Regardless of your taste, we’ve got you covered.

Seasons, Licenses & Regulations


- Ruffed grouse season: As an upland game bird, ruffed grouse seasons and regulations change periodically. Always check the latest Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) small game regulations.
- Sharp-tailed grouse: Though rare in much of the U.P., a sharp-tailed grouse season exists in limited areas (especially around Chippewa County) under strict rules, including purchasing a free sharp-tailed grouse stamp.
- Public hunting access: Much of the land in the

U.P. is open to public hunting (~95% in some hands, as some guides mention), though access and terrain conditions matter significantly.

- GEMS (Grouse Enhanced Management Sites): The state maintains “GEMS” – walk-in accessible areas with improved trails and habitat maps to assist grouse and woodcock hunters.


